Mozambique has a total population of about 29 million people and is located on the southeast coast of Africa. To the East, is the Indian Ocean, Tanzania, Malawi and Zambia is to the north, to the west is Zimbabwe and South Africa and to the South, Swaziland and South Africa. The total area of Mozambique is 799 380 Km square from North to South. It is tropical hot and humid. The hottest and wettest months in Maputo are December to February, when the average daily minimum temperatures are around 22°C and the average daily highs of 30°C. The rain season is between October and April. Winters (June to August) are mild with the average daily temperature ranging from 13°C to 24°C. Basic health facilities and food are available everywhere. The security situation is reliable, but some precaution is needed at the same time. Communication and transport services are available at various costs. Regarding accommodation and food, houses and apartments can be rented from US\$ 600 to US\$ 1,000 per month and meals at the restaurant

cost between US\$ 10 and US\$ 30. Food, household commodities and clothing can be found in shops and local markets at reasonable prices. An entry visa is required for all travelers and must be obtained from Mozambican Embassy prior to travelling. The metical is the local currency and exchange rate stands at USD 1 equivalent to about 58 meticaís (MZM) as per August 2018. Commercial banks are operational in the country and Visa cards are accepted in very limited hotels. Maputo is categorized as a family duty station offering a variety of different accommodation options. It has a vibrant international community whilst also providing excellent opportunities to work in a national, Mozambican context.

As this is a national UN Volunteer assignment, the UN Volunteer will be responsible for arranging his/her own housing and other living essentials. National UN Volunteers are part of the malicious insurance plan.

Organizational Context & Project Description

UNDP's Country Programme priorities were defined with national counterparts in alignment with the five-year government plan (PQG), the United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF) 2017-2020, the priorities of the UNDP Strategic Plan, and the Istanbul Programme of Action for least developed countries.

Early recovery is a vital element of an effective humanitarian crisis response as a foundation for building resilience in post-crisis settings. Just as emergency relief activities are crucial to saving lives by responding to the most urgent human needs, integrating an early recovery approach within humanitarian operations is crucial to the first efforts of a community to recover. It prepares the ground for an effective 'exit strategy' for humanitarian actors and contributes to 'durable solutions' by establishing the base on which nationally-led development occurs after a crisis.

UNDP has developed a range of interventions that focus on three interlinked and transformative pillars:

- (a) Sustainable and inclusive economic transformation;
- (b) Resilience and natural resources management;
- (c) Good governance, peace and social cohesion.

UNDP's vision of the cyclone recovery programme arises from key considerations related to development, governance and resilience. It has three important strands:

1. help the communities recover from the impact of cyclone and floods and rebuild their assets and livelihoods with a focus on women and persons with disabilities;
2. develop national capacities and systems to plan and implement the recovery programme;

3. build community and national resilience to reduce the impact of disasters.

This UNV assignment is part of UNDP's early recovery programme in Mozambique.

Sustainable Development Goals 1. No poverty

Task description

Within the delegated authority and under the supervision of Head of Beira Field Unit or his/her designated mandated representative(s), the UNV – Information Management Specialist will:

General Responsibilities

- Report to the UNDP Early Recovery working group (ER) Coordinator
- Support the Early Recovery Working Group (ERWG) with information on ER needs-response-gaps
- Provide ER Information Management support to existing cluster IM capacities for Humanitarian Country Team (HCT/ICCG) key decision-making including advocacy. These services will include, data collection, linkage, collation, analysis, dissemination processes relevant to the needs of the cluster. This will require building additional and appropriate capacity through the training of additional staff and managing, organizing, and conducting these activities.

Data Gathering, Tools and Process

- Proactively gathering of ER information from UNDP, clusters and other partner/sources which may be of use to the ERWGs in building a database other stakeholders ER actions, mapping of ER action including movement of beneficiaries segregated by gender, vulnerable groups etc,
- Identify and use secondary data and information resources including loss and damage.
- Anticipate information needs and suggest appropriate tools or products to meet the needs of ER working group, clusters and partners.
- Inventory of relevant common sector data sets, including population data disaggregated by age and sex; Assess and adapt appropriate existing ER Information Management tools including those available in country
- Identify barriers for information collection, collation, analysis and sharing and develop appropriate supportive strategies which includes convincing cluster lead agencies of the purpose and importance of collecting and sharing ER data/information by providing a timely, added value service to all stakeholders
- Review and automate the updating of the ER database of humanitarian partners that includes “Who does What Where When (4W)”, a database on ongoing and derivative products, such as maps
- Further develop simple, user-friendly ER cluster monitoring reporting formats in consultation with other key stakeholders

Needs Assessment

- As appropriate, assist in collection and improvement of ER data collection, ensuring that the purpose

and use of all data collected is clear, questions are simple, clear, collectable and easily collatable and/or automated, highlighting where potential problems may arise;

- Support the data input and initial analysis and presentation of ER data;
- Support the needs-response-gaps identification for the ERWG and the clusters; facilitating and agreeing boundaries/benchmarks to enable prioritization within the ERWG and clusters

Dissemination and Access to Information for Stakeholders

- Support the inventory of relevant documents on ER, i.e. mission reports, assessments, evaluations, analysis, publications research, ER partner details etc;
- Develop simple and effective methods to share ER information in an appropriate way (ie not all stakeholders have access to the same type of information systems) using internet, e-mail groups, hard copies, verbal feedback and suggest ways of dissemination of information to affected communities as part of accountability to affected populations;

Information Management and Liaison

- Liaise with cluster Information Management Focal Points in Maputo, Beira and Pemba; share information as appropriate and identify and gather information from others which can inform ERWG and UNDP ER programming.
- Work with INGC/Government and other relevant stakeholders on the systems and processes to ensure continued for effective ER information sharing with partners for strengthened coordination and programming
- Liaise with local, national authorities, clusters and humanitarian/development partners (incl. agencies and NGO's) on data – particularly to assess and access existing information
- Ensure that information management activities support national information systems, standards, build local capacities and maintain appropriate links with relevant Government, State and local authorities, thus seek to strengthen national efforts

Other

- Any other tasks that may be required to achieve the objective of this assignment
